PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Recently I consulted my Holy Bible, King James Version, Red Letter Edition. The Red Letter, as some of you may know, refers to the New Testament, and there is a note that states "with all the words recorded therein as having been spoken by our Lord printed in RED". I often go to this Bible when I feel the readings in other bibles I own (The Living Bible and NIV Study Bible) leave me a little empty. You know, it's when I feel like something I'm reading now is not quite like what I remember reading in the past.

My Red Letter edition was presented to me at St. Matthew Lutheran Church, York, PA, on Sept 25, 1955 (I was one month away from my 9th birthday) by the Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. Niles Lewis. Anyway, the point here is I found a letter inside (No it wasn't lost. I knew it was there. I've read it many times over the years). The letter was postmarked Dec. 4, 1959 (I was 13) and was from Pastor Fred (Fred Shilling) our Youth Pastor. I was very active in Luther League at the time, as it was my primary method of meeting and socializing with boys and, most importantly, girls my age from several schools in our urban setting.

I feel compelled to share the content of the letter with you for several reasons, it is short and to the point, made me feel good about myself at 13, and as I read it over the years, it made me realize God had a plan for me if I would stay the course. You see, Pastor Fred's little letter helped me over the years, to stay the course and be able to serve this congregation today (I'm 67 now, and 43 years later that letter still has meaning). I am forever grateful to Pastor Fred for taking those few minutes to send me this personal note. So, here it is.

Dear Dick,

Thanks for the splendid way you handled the discussion group last Sunday. You showed an ability to lead the leaguers in an excellent manner. Keep up the good work. All such experiences will be very valuable to you as you grow in years and in wisdom in serving the Lord and others. See you Sat. night at 7:30.

I have long forgotten the discussion group details, but I have come to learn the meaning of the last sentence (growing in years and wisdom). You may have had a Pastor Fred in your life. Whether you have or not, you personally have opportunities in your life to have a positive and motivating impact on young people in our church community and family. If they are not your kids, learn their names, greet them by name, ask them questions, narrow that generation gap, get involved in youth programs, challenge and motivate them to participate in the life of the church, recognize their good works in and out of church, volunteer to be a Confirmation Mentor, volunteer to serve on the Youth and Family Ministry. You never know the lasting power and impact your own faith and wisdom, as witnessed by your actions and words (no matter how brief), may have on our youth. They are the future of Christ's church on earth.

CAPITAL APPEAL

Our Home Maintenance

In 1971, the congregation of Saint Matthew Lutheran Church, acted with great courage, to establish the physical plant that would be utilized by generations to come as their spiritual home.

Now, in 2014, one of those generations (Ours) is being asked to display the same courage so this spiritual home will be here for additional generations to come. We need to maintain and enhance our physical plant for our benefit and those of future generations.

Our Property Team has identified a number of equipment replacements that will be required in the near future, and Congregational surveys have identified requested enhancements. The Facilities Task Force continues to study longer term issues such as accessibility.

- 1. Replace roofing in Education wing/Main building
- 2. Replace main boiler
- 3. Air conditioning for Fellowship Hall was identified on the Mission 2015 Facilities Survey as the highest priority, along with the library and education wing.
- 4. The four restrooms, not including the church office or choir room, need at least major cosmetic upgrades.
- 5. Replace carpeting in Shockey Lounge and Education wing.
- 6. Pay for the sanctuary air conditioner we had to replace last summer.

The total cost of this work is estimated to be \$200,000. Consider coming to the **March 30th Adult Forum** to hear the details. Pledge cards will be sent to the congregation on April 21,2014. Please give this work your prayerful consideration.

ANOTHER YEAR OF GOD'S GRACE

This is a special month in the history of Saint Matthew Lutheran Church. Sixty-four years ago on April 16, 1950, the church was chartered in a service in the Moorestown Community House. Many of us know the story of how our congregation came to be, but it is always good to look back to that time and to reflect on how far we have come.

We have much for which to be thankful as we enter into our 65th year:

- The **dream** of The Rev. Ralph Shockey and his wife Dorothy to have a Lutheran church in Moorestown when he became superintendent of the new Lutheran Home in 1947.
- The **inspiring** worship services which brought enough people to move from the Lutheran Home to the Moorestown Community House, which led to the charter in 1950.
- The vision of those "pioneers" to purchase the original Presbyterian church property at 318 Chester Avenue in November 1950.
- The **diligence** of men and women to remodel the sanctuary, maintain the property and encourage others to join the new congregation.
- The **exciting** growth of the congregation to the point that more space was needed for Sunday school classes and thus, a new education building in 1962.
- The commitment to long range planning which led to building a new facility for a sanctuary, library, lounge and offices and joining it to the education building and the old parish hall.
- The **joy and celebration** at the dedication in September 1972 when architect Herman Hassinger said he hoped it would be a "legacy to the future, an inspiration to the present and an echo of the past."
- The **commitment** of gifted pastors and associates through the years we've been together: Kenneth Frickert, J. Brooks Moore, Edwin L. Ehlers, Herluf M. Jensen, Edward Dufresne, Carl T. Uehling, Bruce Bassett, Gordon L. Huff, Nancy Hoops Truscott, Mark Hoffman and Ingrid F. Wengert. We had several seminary interns and we also called our first lay rostered person, Associate in Ministry William Lawrence.
- The **dedication** of various staff members to support pastors and each other and many congregation council members who were committed to serving the church.
- The **willingness** of so many during those 64 years who have shared time and talents to do such things as altar guild, choirs, musical productions, lay readers, ushers, greeters, acolytes, crucifers, Vacation Bible school, activities with Camden churches, Stephen Ministry, committees for many different projects, and groups for women, seniors, youth, drama, fellowship, Bible studies, maintenance, reading and countless other things.
- The **caring hearts and generous gifts** of so many to support the NJ Synod and the ELCA; for the hungry, for Thanksgiving baskets, for disaster relief, for helping to settle refugee families, for "servant trips", for purchasing the property next door, and to establish a beautiful Garden of Remembrance for the interment of ashes of congregation members.
- **Sharing with the community** to help charter MEND, develop a partnership with Bridge of Peace Community Church in Camden, hosting the Moorestown Ministerium Food Pantry, hosting the homeless, welcoming non-profit organizations to use our facilities and so much more.

As we give thanks for the past, we look forward to the future, knowing that we "can do all things through Christ who gives us strength." To God be the glory!

What you need:

- 45 miniature twist pretzels (to make 20 butterflies)
- Cookie sheet covered with parchment paper
- Light cocoa and multicolored Candy Melts (available at craft stores)
- Disposable decorating bags
- M&M's, Skittles, sprinkles, cinnamon drops, etc.

What you do:

- 1. Break five pretzels into pieces for antennae.



PSALM 33

Rejoice in the LORD, O you righteous. Praise befits the upright. ² Praise the LORD with the lyre; make melody to him with the harp of ten strings. ³ Sing to him a new song; play skillfully on the strings, with loud shouts. ⁴ For the word of the LORD is upright, and all his work is done in faithfulness. ⁵ He loves righteousness and justice; the earth is full of the steadfast love of the LORD. ⁶ By the word of the LORD the heavens were made, and all their host by the breath of his mouth. ⁷He gathered the waters of the sea as in a bottle; he put the deeps in storehouses. ⁸ Let all the earth fear the LORD; let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of him. ⁹ For he spoke, and it came to be; he commanded, and it stood firm. ¹⁰ The LORD brings the counsel of the nations to nothing; he frustrates the plans of the peoples. ¹¹ The counsel of the LORD stands forever, the thoughts of his heart to all generations. ¹² Happy is the nation whose God is the LORD, the people whom he has chosen as his heritage. ¹³ The LORD looks down from heaven; he sees all humankind. ¹⁴ From where he sits enthroned he watches all the inhabitants of the earth— 15 he who fashions the hearts of them all, and observes all their deeds. ¹⁶ A king is not saved by his great army; a warrior is not delivered by his great strength. ¹⁷ The war horse is a vain hope for victory, and by its great might it cannot save. ¹⁸ Truly the eye of the LORD is on those who fear him, on those who hope in his steadfast love, 19 to deliver their soul from death, and to keep them alive in famine. ²⁰ Our soul waits for the LORD; he is our help and shield. ²¹ Our heart is glad in him, because we trust in his holy name. ²² Let your steadfast love, O LORD, be upon us, even as we hope in you.

SOCIAL CONCERNS

<u>Live Civilly/Moorestown Ministerium Food Pantry</u> and the Feinstein Foundation Challenge

Over the last three years, the pantry at Saint Matthew has gone through an evolution of sorts. What started as a family project, graciously supported by and backed by the Saint Matthew Congregation, has grown into a community-wide effort serving more than 200 people monthly. During these three years, Live Civilly has continued to support the pantry through volunteer, food and financial contributions as the Ministerium Partners have increased their participation. All the while, the number of patrons increases monthly and the need in our community grows larger.

In an effort to help offset financial needs, Live Civilly has recently become one of the many independent, hunger fighting agencies in the United States to take The Feinstein Foundation Challenge. The Feinstein Foundation (located in Rhode Island) is an organization which for the last 16 years has donated collaborative funds to independent , local, 501c3 non-profits that fight hunger. For every can of peas, box of pasta, jar of peanut butter or dollar you donate to Live Civilly (Live Civilly/Moorestown Ministerium Pantry) between now and April 30, The Feinstein Foundation will provide complimentary funds. The more donations Live Civilly receives, the more money the Foundation will allocate toward Live Civilly.

Additionally, any donations (cash or in-kind) directed to the ExCELS Snack Program, the Live Civilly/Moorestown Ministerium Food Pantry or any other Live Civilly nutritional outreach vehicle will count toward this challenge. Donations from the Food For All Campaign, which is running through the Moorestown Twp. Public Schools, will count toward this effort as well. The Food For All monthly food drive will occur on the 2nd Friday of each month in each of the six Moorestown schools. The bounty from this event will be shared with the Live Civilly/Moorestown Ministerium Pantry, the Bethel AME Food Pantry, and the First Baptist Church Food Pantry.



Stephen Ministry ~ Trustworthy on the Caregivers Compass



Trustworthy—What does that mean? The dictionary defines it as 'that which can be depended upon; deserving confidence, reliable, faithful.' What does it mean for Stephen Ministers to be trustworthy? Stephen Ministers trust in the Lord. Psalm 121:1-2 '...from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.'

Stephen Ministers trust what has been taught in extensive training and trust in the Stephen Leaders, Pastor Wengert, and peer support. As Stephen Ministers, we must trust and have confidence in ourselves and be dependable. Care receivers rely on us to live up to our promise to provide confidential care and to stick with them for the long haul. Even when care giving becomes difficult, a Stephen Minister remains committed to the caring relationship.

Confidentiality is an essential component of being trustworthy. What happens in a caring relationship is never told, and the identity of the care receiver is always kept confidential during peer supervision meetings. We, Stephen Ministers, follow through on our promises to the congregation, our Stephen Leaders, and our fellow Stephen Ministers by faithfully attending continuing education classes once a month and the twice-a-month peer supervision sessions.

Stephen Ministers want to establish a "Safe House" with and for care receivers. It is a place where it is okay to share about themselves and to begin to trust. Grace-Based Acceptance is the foundation. In a non-judgmental manner a person is accepted, valued, and cherished. In *John 15:2*, Jesus taught, 'Love each other as I have loved you.' We, Stephen Ministers, use active listening by focusing all our attention on the care receiver. It requires personal involvement, empathy, and commitment. We reflect feelings, clarify, and share understanding. We use prayer with care receivers throughout the caring relationship, trusting in God as the Great Healer. Grace-Based Acceptance, Listening, Empathy, and Confidentiality are elements creating Trust. Trust is the door through which care receivers enter to begin sharing and healing.

Leaving a Footprint



This article is the forth in a series to Saint Matthew's members to inform and encourage greater awareness of your *Saint Matthew Memorial Fund*. This month we discuss the question, "Can things other than money be donated to Saint Matthew – and if so, what and why?"

<u>First the **WHY**</u>... Simply put we all want to take care of our families on a daily basis "financially" and in our estate plans by passing those assets to

them. But do our estate plans (wills and final bequests) need to also remember and care for the God's work through the church, that is the gospel of Jesus Christ?

Think about it—should we instead be saying, "God I trust you with my life's financial resources so much that I'm going to put some of it into your reach so that you can use it your way?" We already talked about how Saint Matthew's will be a faithful steward to your legacy and his legacy.

Now the **WHAT**... We wrote about the benefits of donating stocks (and bonds) as a way beyond checks to step out in faith. You can also gift possessions like real estate and unneeded automobiles - to name a few. Real estate donations provide highly beneficial tax results with the tax deduction determined by the current market value of the property, as opposed to the cost of the property when it was purchased (possibly skipping capital gain taxation). Sometimes the donation can relieve you and your heirs of the burden of maintenance and strife that can result from inheriting or passing a tangible property- freeing financial assets to pass without complication.

In closing the reminder — <u>What's your footprint</u>? Do you wish a footprint that provides witness to your heirs about the importance of your Christian faith and the church in your life? Remembering the *Saint Matthew Memorial Fund* is one way your faith can be transferred to the next generation.

A bequest to our church can be any asset, investment, monetary amount or percentage designated to the Saint Matthew Memorial Fund. You can specify a specific congregational ministry or the general Memorial Fund, which will allow for a large collective future endeavor, creating a lasting legacy and also the flexibility for a major outreach, new mission or church expansion/facility upgrade.
