PASTOR'S MESSAGE

I've had one of the most demanding and stressful summers in recent years. When innocently asked "How are you? Had a nice summer?" I've thought to myself "No!" or "Do I really tell them? What can I say without sounding too negative?!" Just imagine how people struggle with such innocent questions who are experiencing *truly* difficult times such as dealing with a serious illness or the death of a loved one?

This got me thinking about how caring people (& congregations) might be more intentionally compassionate to people who are going through difficult times. Here are a few thoughts:

- Recognize that the question "how are you?" can be emotionally loaded, and probably best avoided in a public setting. Even adding the single word "today" (how are you today?) helps a little with the overwhelming nature of the question.
- Approach the person as more than his/her disease or grief. Recently, a pastor wrote his congregation inviting them not to ask about his health all the time as he wanted to live each day to the fullest and not focus on & discuss his cancer 24/7.
- Don't expect a medical update in the case of illness. When approaching a person, the purpose is to *support them* and not to *expect anything from* them. It can be exhausting to tell the same details over and over again. If the person wants to talk about medical details, then it's certainly a way to support them; otherwise, you may receive the latest information, but at their expense. If you are a person who likes to know the medical details, the question to ask yourself is "how can knowing this help me support them?" If it doesn't, then it might not be necessary to know.
- Avoid bumper sticker theology at all costs! Most of these sayings aren't Christian, anyways (e.g., "All things happen for a reason," etc...). My personal theory is that adages are an attempt by the person *saying* them to make sense of life by coming up with answers. That's because offering compassion to someone as they grieve (or struggle with health treatments) puts us in a vulnerable position, as we can't *fix* anything but merely stand by and watch. Perhaps that's a good way to think about it we stand *with* them. In doing so, we might simply share that we love or care for them, they'll be part of our prayer life or in our prayers, or simply that we're sorry for their loss or diagnosis. And in the course of a long illness or grief, people never seem to mind hearing a simple "it's good to see you!"

On one hand, there isn't a single way to tend to people going through difficult times, and nobody should be overly worried about saying the right or wrong thing. In the end, people usually discern that whatever is said comes from a place of care and concern. On the other hand, we can always learn more and offer better care to others.

Oh, and me? My summer slowed down nicely in mid-August, and so it's safe to ask me about it! :-)

PROPERTY



Gutters on the south side of the main building were cleaned due to a large accumulation of roof granules in them. Tall ladders were used to replace a light in the altar ring and a "slope" light

in the sanctuary. A faucet in a utility closet had to have the washers replaced for both the hot and cold stems. A shelf was replaced for the food pantry that had been damaged by some water leakage.

The carpets in rooms 107-109 were replaced thanks to a grant from the St. Matthew Memorial Fund. Two new portable air conditioners were installed in the library using funds from the Capital Campaign. The old window air conditioner in the library was donated to Moorestown Ecumenical Neighborhood Development (MEND). Three new window air conditioners were installed in the Education Wing using Capital Campaign funds. The new wiring to support these air conditioners was nearly complete as of the date of this article. All classrooms in the lower level of the Education Wing now have window air conditioners. A contractor cut down and removed 3 dead trees from the grove and north lot of the church property, along with a large branch that had fallen in the grove from a neighbor's property.

Hutchinson installed the new air conditioner for the church office on August 13-14. The office phone system was powered from one of the electric system breakers for the old air conditioner causing the phones to be inoperable for most of August 13 and part of August 14. Funds from the Capital Campaign were used for this project which also included complete energy efficient lighting replacement in the Education wing as reported last month.

The selection of new carpeting for the Shockey Lounge has still not been completed as of this writing. It was erroneously reported as being completed last month.

Fourteen scouts attended summer camp and the boys earned 38 merit badges. Our first year scouts worked on rank advancements in the camp Pathways program. The scouts had a great time at camp.
