PASTOR'S MESSAGE

After the U.S legalized same-sex marriage in June, 2015, the Executive Committee decided it was time for the Council to discuss what that might mean for St. Matthew, and so the Council has been discussing it on and off since last fall. In the process, Council desired to include voices from the congregation. Also, Council found some things I presented to be helpful, and encouraged me to lead adult forums in the only 2 dates that remained unscheduled before summer. One session already took place in April: "Church and government: What is the church's role in weddings?" and the next session (moved to 5/1) will be an update on what is happening in the ELCA & our Lutheran mission cluster (in Burlington and Camden counties), and will allow time for conversation, reflection and questions.

After leading the first session and speaking with people the week afterwards, I've realized that it would also be helpful to offer a review of the whole sexuality statement and also how Lutherans interpret scripture. So, here are two more opportunities for learning and discussion:

June 5, 12 - Led by Pastor Ingrid Wengert

"2009 ELCA Social Statement Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust" (elca.org + copies available)

The social statement encompasses the breadth of human sexuality, with the helpful understanding that it is both God's good gift to us, and that God entrusts us with it, as stewards, given that all human beings are "east of Eden" (broken/out of kilter) when it comes to intimacy and relationship - because of sin.

July 24, 31 – Led by Prof. Timothy Wengert

"Human Sexuality in Light of Scripture"

In the first session, we will look at varying approaches to the interpretation of scripture, and in the second session, at particular texts that deal with human sexuality.

The purpose of any of these sessions is *not* to try to persuade people or change their minds. The purpose is to offer conversation, clarification, and hear what's on the hearts of parishioners. The reason that the scripture sessions are later in the summer is because my husband returns from Germany only then, and I thought it would be worth the wait as he is such a gifted and knowledgeable teacher. I very much want folks to know that there have always been varying ways to interpret scripture (i.e., St. Augustine, Bishop of Hippo, in the 4th century debated different ways to interpret the creation stories and found some ways unhelpful). Most importantly, I wish that folks might be aware of and even conversant in how Lutherans approach scripture. That is, for the sake of the gospel, there is a heart and center for Lutherans when it comes to interpreting the Bible - in order to ensure that the good news of the crucified and risen Christ remains clear and unbound.

Save the Date! Sunday, June 5th

The June Semi-Annual Congregation Meeting will be held following the worship service on June 5th. The Order of Business includes: Annual Reports from all the ministries/committees, Election of new Congregation Council members, and a very important update on our Facility Planning projects.

At the April Congregation Council meeting the Council approved the creation of an Accessibility Steering Committee. This committee will be delivering a presentation at the June Semi-Annual meeting which will reveal the budget cost estimates for the three related accessibility projects below:

- ◆ 1a. Relocate the Sacristy to the foyer level
- Construct two (2) single user toilet rooms at the foyer level
- Install a wheelchair lift for access from the foyer level into the Gymnasium building

You don't want to miss this meeting! This is the **beginning** of something big, a whole new vision for our church and church family. This is the beginning of the journey towards a vision where all God's children who enter St. Matthew will one day have full, safe and comfortable access to all areas of our church campus and it's many ministries and activities.

I also want to take this opportunity to inform you that after having served four years on the Congregation Council, with three of those years as the Council president, I have resigned effective end of the June 2016 Congregation Council meeting. Alice and I both plan to remain very active in the life of this wonderful church. I have volunteered to serve as the chairperson for the Accessibility Steering Committee mentioned above. At the Semi-Annual Meeting we will be announcing the names of those who will be serving with me on this new committee.





One of the points Pastor Wengert made was that forgiveness is not the church's forgiveness or the pastor's forgiveness or the Christian's forgiveness, but God's forgiveness. We are to hear the forgiveness as coming from God's own lips.

At the end of our class, we shared the words, "In the name of Jesus, your sins are forgiven," as we put our hands on each other's heads. As a result of our class, on Maundy Thursday, Pastor Wengert was inspired to offer that same blessing individually to those in attendance at the service. So many came forward that I wonder, if as Lutherans we are aware of the gift of individual confession and forgiveness? (see pg. 243 in the ELW). Sometimes our hearts and souls are so burdened that we need to hear those words for ourselves. If that is the case for you, I encourage you to speak with Pastor Wengert.

TREASURER'S UPDATE

Financial Update: January-March 2016

Current & Benevolence ("C&B") offerings are the primary source of income for Saint Matthew and are vital to support our daily Christian mission and ministry. 89% of the total C&B income for 2016 is budgeted to come from regular giving by the congregation. For the first three months of this year, the C&B budget called for \$102,190 of giving from the congregation; however, actual C&B giving as of the end of March was \$91,241. This represents a budget shortfall of \$10,949 or almost 11% of this first quarter budget plan.

Every congregation member will receive a C&B Offering Status Report in mid-April that will provide an update of individual giving during the first 3 months of 2016. If you submitted an Estimate of Giving Card for 2016, the total amount of your Estimate for 2016 is provided on the Report. The Report also shows the amount of your Estimated Giving that would be expected by the end of March if you gave on a regular weekly or monthly basis. Then the Report shows your actual C&B giving, as recorded through the end of March. By comparing these last 2 amounts, you can see if your C&B giving is above, on pace with, or behind the budget expectations.

Whether or not you submitted an Estimate of Giving Card for 2016, and whether or not you may be ahead or behind in your estimated giving, the continuing support of all active members is important to avoid operating deficits. This is vital to sustaining our church's vibrant mission and ministry. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions about the budget or other finance matters at Saint Matthew.

Andrew Steele will lead Adult Forum, May 22:

Andrew is a son of the congregation, being confirmed at St. Matthew, and has not forgotten his Jersey roots. He now serves as the Director for ELCA Global Church Sponsorship, which raises church-wide support for ELCA Missionaries, Young Adults in Global Mission, (YAGM) Global Ministry Projects and the International Women Leaders scholarships. These ministries make up \$33 million of the \$198 million goal as part of Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA. Andrew's portfolio of projects ranges from building a Lutheran Centre & Clinic in South Sudan, to sponsoring medical doctors in Tanzania, to growing the YAGM program to 94 participants during his tenure. Andrew got his first experience with the global church when he served as a Young Adult in Global Mission volunteer in Bloemfontein, South Africa in 2010-2011. Saint Matthew was very generous in their support of Andrew, something that instilled in him a passion for service and philanthropy. P.S. Andrew continues to lament his Philadelphia sports fandom.

IN MEMORIAM

A Personal Remembrance

On April 5, I attended the funeral service for the Rev. Carl T. Uehling, pastor of Saint Matthew Church from September 1978 until September 1986. The service was held in the chapel of the Lutheran Community at Telford, PA, where he and his wonderful wife Jean had been living for several years.

I first met Carl Uehling in 1978 when I served on the call committee for a new pastor following Pastor Jensen's election as President of the NJ Synod. We selected him from the four candidates we were given because of his experience as a pastor in various churches as well as for his creativity as Features Editor of The Lutheran magazine. I was superintendent of the Sunday school when he arrived in September and he had many new ideas for us. When we decided to sponsor a missionary through the generous Sunday school offerings, he suggested Dennis & Meredith Murnyak because he was impressed when he interviewed them for a feature article in The Lutheran. We loved hearing about their work in Tanzania and having them visit from time to time through many years.

Some of my fondest memories of Pastor Uehling are tied to his use of drama in worship. During Advent and Lent for several years, Pastor Uehling wrote short clever dramas usually based on the Old Testament lessons for each Sunday. As director of Saint Matthew Players, it was my job to find actors and direct the dramas, which were great fun for us, added a modern twist to the lessons, and enhanced the worship experience. Some titles of those dramas are indicative of his creativity: "Abram and Sarai are transferred", "The prodigal and the prude", "It must have been something I ate" and "What's for dinner?". Ruth Fausak, Vicki Williams, Stu Haroldson, Lyle Clark, Bill Shepherd, Jr. and Charleen Behrschmidt were frequent participants. The dramas were much appreciated by all who saw them.

When the call committee had interviewed Pastor Uehling, he made it clear that he believed strongly in keeping worship services to one hour and he followed that practice through his ministry here. His sermons were creative and brought new perspectives to scriptures and old ideas.

Pastor Uehling and Archie Brown "hired" me to be Archie's assistant in the office in 1981. During the next five years he brought the office into 20th century technology and prepared us for the future. Archie and I did not want to give up our IBM Selectric typewriters, but he and Assistant Pastor Bruce Bassett insisted that we learn how to use a computer. Radio Shack computers were purchased and we learned how to use them (very slowly!). Thankfully the pastors were patient with us. Our first copy machine was primitive but it wasn't long before more up to date ones were added and we admitted they were so much better than the old mimeograph machines. Because of his previous experience as a writer, Pastor Uehling knew the importance of technology in all of our printing as we moved on toward the 21st century.

I cannot end this piece without mentioning one of my most vivid memories of Pastor Uehling. One of our interns, Kurt Strause, had become engaged during his internship and we loved both him and his fiancee Lois. I was asked to plan a "mock wedding" for the party the church was giving for them when he completed his internship. (In a "mock wedding" the gender of all participants was reversed; i.e., the bride was a man and the groom was a woman, etc.) I asked Pastor Uehling to be the flower girl. There are still many people in this congregation who remember his appearance in green tights and short skirt as he danced down the aisle, throwing dandelions! His mother who was in the audience did not recognize him.

Early in 1986, Pastor Uehling began to show me how to put together a monthly Messenger. He had been the editor since he became our pastor and I thought he was doing a fine job. I didn't know then that he had plans to retire later that year and so I learned from his expertise and used the tools he taught me as long as I served as editor. He was an excellent teacher.

Pastor Uehling was active in the community as a member of Rotary, serving as treasurer for a time. He began the University of Life program through the Moorestown Ministerium which brought together members of most of the Moorestown churches for "courses" related to religion and life. He also was instrumental in starting Interfaith Caregivers, which became part of The Tender in Moorestown.

When Pastor Uehling retired from the ministry and left Saint Matthew Church in 1986, he and a friend started a full service communications company (Genesis Communications) that served non profit organizations and businesses. My daughter Kristen worked for the company one summer as a graphic designer when she was in college. He had confirmed her and she gained a new appreciation and respect for him as a talented entrepreneur during that summer.

The Uehlings retired to the family farm in western Pennsylvania where they lived for a number of years before moving to Telford because of his struggles with debilitating dementia. His funeral service was a moving tribute to him and a celebration of his life. All nine of his grandchildren participated. Personal remembrances included one from a granddaughter who spoke for all of the grandchildren (and four great grandchildren); Earl, his youngest of four sons, a junior in high school when they moved to Moorestown, who spoke for the children; and The Rev. Bruce Bassett, (retired) who was an intern and an assistant pastor with him at Saint Matthew. All spoke of his love of life and fun, his devotion to his family and his service to the church. I feel blessed to have known Carl Uehling. I'm grateful for all I learned from him and for what he did to make Saint Matthew Church a better place to worship and to work.

I am thankful for this part-time position which allows me to serve the Church outside of a congregational setting. My job description is rather broad, and has me interfacing with a number of areas of student life, and while it is a bit complicated, it is kind of fun to dust off my managerial and administrative skills.

But, as my wife would happily agree, our *most* important update would be Yuki and Nutmegtwo five-month Pomsky puppies (Pomerian + Siberian Husky). They are sisters we got back in January, and have made life a bit more crazy but a lot more fun.
