This year, I was privileged to participate in the annual End-of-Term Christmas program at the Elementary School of our ELCA partner 'Senegalese Lutheran Development Services.' For the finale, Santa Claus arrived with a gift for the younger students - who are both Muslims and Christians.


Pastor Kristin Engstrom
