Pastor's Message


Pastor Eric J. Trozzo

At the July 18 Council meeting, the *Live the Love* mission plan was adopted, including most of the concrete proposals included. Thank you to all who gave feedback and participated in the process of imagining where God may be calling this congregation. The feedback was heard and discussed.

Now comes the exciting part of living out this mission plan. The goal of the plan is to inspire all of us to consider how our energies may be focused by the call to live out God's love. Where do you see God's love in the world? Are there ways that you particularly recognize receiving God's love? God's love starts our actions; we do not do it on our own. To feel God's love in our hearts is to be moved by the Holy Spirit. Yet that kind of movement does not stay inside of us. The Holy Spirit urges us forward in deep love and care for others. Once we recognize how we receive God's love, we begin to find ways to share God's love. We do this in many ways, but our mission plan calls us to particularly pay attention to four ways that we express God's love and live it out for the sake of others:

- Love within our congregation
- Love our local and global community
- Love all of God's Creation
- Love through diverse inclusion

Let these four areas inspire you. How can we live out the gracious gift of God's love in these different areas? What ways do we already do that, and where might God be moving us to do a new thing within these areas? We will begin implementing some concrete new ways to take part in God's loving work over the next few months, such as through participating in "God's Work Our Hands" Sunday in September. That is just the beginning, though. The excitement comes from the ideas that have not yet been formed that are inspired by the desire to live the love. All of us can imagine what might be possible and contribute our ideas. I can't wait to see where God's love takes us!

COUNCIL UPDATE

Recently, there have been some questions regarding the proposed construction project involving the area near the north end of the building's narthex. This project has a long history involving multiple moving parts.

In 2019, a four year loan of \$120,000, from the Memorial Fund, was approved at a special congregational meeting. This loan was to cover the cost of replacing the sanctuary roof, upgrade the lighting in the sanctuary, upgrade the fire alarm panel and upgrade accessibility at the rear entrance of the education wing. The work was completed in 2019 and 2020 at a final cost of \$109,000. The cost of the work and the repayment of the loan was to be covered by a future capital appeal.

As everyone knows, the Hassinger property sold in February of 2022, with SMLC receiving \$203,503 in proceeds from the sale. In March of 2022, the existing \$75,000 loan from the Memorial Fund was re-paid using proceeds from the sale of the property.

Most recently, architectural plans have been submitted for a construction plan along the north side of the building's narthex to include adding a sacristy, accessible restrooms, a newer vestibule and an adjustment to the existing driveway. At the congregational meeting in February of 2022, a vote approved an expenditure of \$50,000 for architectural and engineering services to prepare a bid/permit application package.

Although no visible signs of movement on this project can be seen, please know that there is a lot of work going on behind the scenes. It is anticipated that a bid/permit package should be completed by August 30th of 2022. Once this has been finalized, construction bids will be solicited.



COUNCIL UPDATE

It is further expected that bids should be received by the end of September. At that point we should be on solid ground with proposed construction costs. It is estimated that the finance package will include a proposed 3 to 5 year Capital Appeal to assist in funding the package. Once this has all taken place, a finance package will be assembled by the Finance Committee. This will be followed by a Special Congregational meeting, at which time a vote will be taken to approve the project and the finance package.

There has been discussion regarding the use of the proceeds from the sale of the Hassinger property. No decision has been made regarding how these proceeds will be used or distributed. It is understood by Council that moving forward with the proposed construction project is not the only issue in which finances are relevant. Several congregants have expressed interest in using some of the proceeds from the sale of the property in other areas. <u>ALL</u> of St. Matthew's congregants have a voice. To allow for those voices to be heard, the Adult Forum session for Sunday, September 25th, has been scheduled to hear from those who wish to present their ideas. This will be an opportunity for those who are looking to provide feedback and ideas regarding other mission related expenditures. Hopefully this feedback will contain specific outlines along with approximated budgetary values.

SMLC is embarking on a new era. Some of the new changes may observed to be to the physical building, others may be seen in how we approach our ministries. But the common goal will always to be meeting our mission through Christ.


CLF is also looking for someone to help coordinate Adult Forum. This mainly consists of helping with scheduling and introducing speakers and topics to the audience each week.

STEPHEN MINISTRY

Stephen Ministry Offers A Safe Place

How are you?
Being able to answer honestly, "I am hurting," is freeing for a care receiver.

The weight of living lessens a little as the care receiver is able to talk honestly, without policing oneself, about his or her deepest thoughts and feelings. These conversations are not awkward because of the Stephen Minister's faith-based acceptance and the mutual trust developed through confidential discussions, sharing scriptures, and praying together.

A Stephen Minister is a safe person to talk to because a trained Stephen Minister realizes **listening** is most important in their time together. Listening as a Caregiver means:

- Being focused on what the care receiver is sharing.
- Being attentive to how ideas are shared.
- Being responsive by expressing in the Stephen Minister's own words what the care receiver has just shared, to assure better understanding.
- Being non-judgemental and encouraging.
- Being trustworthy that what is said will stay between the S.M. and the C.R.

Trained Stephen Ministers bring God's Love to their care receivers. Stephen Ministers believe:

"We are the caregivers, God is the Cure Giver".


